



VOLO CENTRE





Volo Centre is a space dedicated to festival volunteers. It is housed in the Museum of Municipal Engineering in Kazimierz and is only accessible to volunteers.

Volo Centre is a space for relaxation and rest. There is always something to drink, snacks and a couch where you can take a nap. You can meet other volunteers there.

Some of the workshops, meetings and preparations for the Festival also take place there.

ACCOMMODATION



Volunteers will be accommodated in dorm rooms booked specially for them, located in Kazimierz.

This is a modern dormitory opened in 2020.

Each room has an ensuite bathroom, small fridge, electric kettle, most of them also have a large balcony. There is free wireless internet throughout the building.

Additionally, each floor has a spacious communal kitchen and there is a common loundry room in the building.

1. How will I know if I got accepted?

We will send you an email.

Between April 18th-24th, we will announce the recruitment results. You will get feedback from us regardless of whether you are accepted. If we invite you to participate in the program, you have to confirm your availability by 1st May.

Then we will buy you tickets and sign a contract.



2.Can I be a volunteer if I am from Krakow?

Yes! However you will not be a beneficiary of European Solidarity Corps program.

It means that we'll not be able to cover you expenses for tickets, accommodation and food. But you will be able to enjoy all the benefits of volunteering, participate in the preparation and festival events:)

3.If I am in Krakow on a different ESC program, can I be a volunteer?

Yes.

If you take part in a long-term project, you can take part in the Festival on the same terms as volunteers from Krakow.



4. Do I need to have a supporting organization?

No.

5.Can I take part in the project if I have already participated in another ECS program?

Yes.

This is team volunteering that you can participate in several times, even having taken part in the long term program.









6. Where will I be accommodated?*

In a twin room in Kazimierz

You will live in dorm rooms booked specifically for volunteers, located in Kazimierz.

7. What will I eat?*

You will get money to cover daily food expences.

Sometimes we will have dinner together in one of Krakow's restaurants.


During the Festival snack and beverages are provided at the Volunteer Centre.

8. How will I know when my shift begins?

There will be a schedule.

A few days before the start of the Festival, there will be an official volunteer briefing, where you will receive a full schedule. Before each event, you'll be given further details on the exact time your shift begins and the name of the coordinator responsible for the event.

9. What if I can't be on my shift?

Let the coordinator know.

It is very important that volunteers show up for their shifts. Without you, the events cannot take place! Of course, there may be an exceptional situation and then, as soon as you know you cannot make it to your shift, be sure to inform the event coordinator.




10. What if I get lost / feel unwell etc.?

Let the coordinator know.

Coordinators are there to help you. They are your emergency contacts as well. Each of them has been a volunteer at some point and they know very well the situations that could happen, so don't hesitate to get in touch with them! Besides, they're really cool people, with a sense of humour;)







11. Will I have to work all day? What time do I start?

You won't be expected to work all day

You will work according to the schedule we prepare. As a rule, volunteers don't work more than 8 hours a day. Of course, between shifts you have breaks during which you can rest. We also try to plan your work so that everyone can take part in festival events as participants.

12. Will I have a lunch break?

13. What if my country's borders are closed?*

We don't anticipate this scenario!;)

But we try to be prepared for it. If connections between your country and Poland are suspended, we will plan transfers via other countries. You may also have to travel by another means of transport (coach, car, train).

If neither of these options are possible, you will not be able to participate in the program this year and hopefully we will meet next year.

14. What if the Polish borders are closed?*

We don't anticipate this scenario either!;)

So far, there is no indication of such a scenario, and by the time we sign contracts with you in May, we will definitely know more about the current situation. We will stay in touch with you and keep you informed in case of any last-minute complications.

15. Is it possible that the program will not take place?*



We are taking all precautionary measures...

...monitoring government announcements, and everything indicates that the situation should not get worse. We will stay in touch with you and inform you about any changes in advance.

16. Can I cancel my participation in the program?*

Probably not.

The tickets we purchase for you are non-refundable and the contracts we sign with you are binding for both sides. Any exceptional cases will be considered individually.

17. Do I have to pay anything, how much will it cost me?*

Nothing.

We cover the cost of return tickets, accommodation and meals, plus you get 120 euros (about 600 zlotys) of pocket money for the entire month. However, you will have to cover additional expenses though, such as cinema tickets, ice cream etc. or other activities which are not part of the festival programe.



18. Who will pay for the COVID test if necessary?*

You will.

Unfortunately, our funding does not cover the cost of testing for COVID-19

19. What if I get infected?

You will have access to a doctor.

Remember that you are insured, but we take responsibility for you. Therefore, we ask you to take care of your health and take all precautions.

20. Do I need to be vaccinated?

Hard to say.

For now, vaccinations are unlikely to become obligatory in Poland, but regulations may change. However, less restrictions apply to vaccinated travellers and you may not be able to cross the border without being vaccinated - keep an eye on the situation and follow the information provided by your respective government.

21. What precautions should I take?

We are all obliged to follow the sanitary regime.

Remember about face covering, hand sanitizing and keeping a safe distance. All

Festival events will be organized in accordance with the safety rules and recommendations in force.






